Counselor's Corner

As part of the guidance program at Wards Creek Elementary School we will be offering small support groups for students in kindergarten through fifth grade. These groups are offered with the hope that students can come together to share concerns or issues that they may have in common with each other. The small group format also provides an opportunity for your child to reinforce skills that will support and enhance his/her academic and social development. Participants for small groups were selected through teacher referrals, parent requests, and counselor referrals. Parental permission is always required for a student to participate in a small group.

We offer a variety of small group formats dealing with issues that regularly occur in a school setting. Small groups run between September 21, 2015 to December 11, 2015. During groups the following topics are typically covered: relational aggression, friendship skills, study skills, anger management/conflict resolution, and changing families/divorce. Additional topics will be developed if a particular need becomes evident. It is our goal to remain open and flexible to the needs of our student population.

Help Your Child Succeed in School: Build the Habit of Good Attendance Early

School success goes hand in hand with good attendance!

DID YOU KNOW?

- · Starting in kindergarten, too many absences can cause children to fall behind in school.
- . Missing 10 percent (or about 18 days) can make it harder to learn to read.
- Students can still fall behind if they miss just a day or two days every few weeks.
- Being late to school may lead to poor attendance.
- Absences can affect the whole classroom if the teacher has to slow down learning to help children catch up.

Attending school regularly helps children feel better about school—and themselves. Start building this habit in preschool so they learn right away that going to school on time, every day is important. Good attendance will help children do well in high school, college, and at work.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

- Set a regular bed time and morning routine.
- Lay out clothes and pack backpacks the night before.
- Find out what day school starts and make sure your child has the required shots.
- Introduce your child to her teachers and classmates before school starts to help her transition.
- Don't let your child stay home unless she is truly sick. Keep in mind complaints of a stomach ache or headache can be a sign of anxiety and not a reason to stay home.
- If your child seems anxious about going to school, talk to teachers, school counselors, or other parents for advice on how to make her feel comfortable and excited about learning.
- Develop back-up plans for getting to school if something comes up. Call on a family member, a neighbor, or another parent.
- Avoid medical appointments and extended trips when school is in session.

They provide essential leadership for a school's entire literacy program by helping create and supervise long-term staff development processes that supports both the development and implementation of the literacy programs over months and years.

CLINIC NEWS: IT'S TIME TO TALK ABOUT LICE!


What are Lice Super Bugs??

A research study in the UK found that parents are failing to follow-up and continually treating head lice after first infestation, causing head lice to spread.

No matter how you treat your child, following up and repeating the treatment is crucial to prevent a second infestation due to the life cycle of the louse. Missing an egg or even one louse during treatment can cause the problem to repeat

itself.



With long and thick hair it is very hard to cover all areas and eliminate all lice during one treatment. Checking the hair once a day for 10 days for any remaining lice or newly hatched lice is important. Depending on the treatment of choice, you made need to repeat the treatment at day 5 and day 10.

The following are essential and keeping your kids hair free of head lice –

 Make sure you know what to look for. Before checking your kid's hair, educate yourself and learn what and where to look for head lice and eggs. <u>The Terminator comb</u> can really be useful with this. Treat as soon as you

suspect that your kid is infested. Also treat other family members.

- Whatever treatment you chose, make sure you read the instructions carefully and take the time to treat the child properly.
- Many kids don't like being treated for head lice which can make the process difficult. Make sure you explain the importance of it to keep them calm and patient.
- Even when treatments claims to kill all head lice in one go, check three to five days after the initial treatment, and 10 to 12 days later again for newly hatched lice.
- Jacksonville/St. Augustine have a couple of professional lice companies to assist with professional removal. Please see Nurse Kalem for information and possible coupons.

This year our Kindergarten classes at Wards Creek have begun a community service project to help our local animal shelters and we need your help!

How you can help:

Clean out your closet and throw in the towel! The shelters are in need of these items:

Blankets, towels, fleece throws, pet beds, and baby blankets.

Think soft, absorbent, and not too bulky... things you'd wash at home. Items that can cushion the bottoms of crates and kennels, and keep dogs' noses, paws and ears dry.

Items that are not so good to donate:

- For the most part, shelters do not want bed sheets—they are not absorbent enough and do not stand up to repeated laundering. Anything too bulky is difficult for the shelter staffs to manage; this precludes comforters, bedspreads, heavy area rugs, queen or kingsized quilts and mattress covers.
- No pillows at all.
- No electric blankets, please, unless the cords are removed.
- No clothes, please!



Free and Reduced Priced Meal Application REMINDER:

Parents are encouraged to complete one Free and Reduced Price Meal Application per family, rather than one per child. The application can be completed ON LINE by going to www.stjohns.K12.fl.us and clicking Free & Reduced Meal Application, which is located on the left side of the page under **Featured Links.** Once completed by the parent/guardian, the form is electronically sent to the Food & Nutrition Services Department for eligibility determination. A printable pdf application form is also available on this link. Schools have limited availability of printed applications. This single application for the family may be returned to any of the District schools where parents have a child/children enrolled; we prefer that parents return the application to the school where their youngest child is enrolled. The schools will be sending all completed applications to the District School Food Services Office for centralized approval. Until the application is processed and approved by the District Food Service Office, any meal charges will be the responsibility of the adult/guardian. The approval process can take up to ten (10) days at the beginning of the school year.

Your student'(s) meal status (free or reduced) at the end of the 14-15 school year will continue up through September 21, 2015. Unless a new 15-16 Family Meal Application has been processed and approved by September 21st, your student'(s) meal status will revert to PAID.

HOW DOES THE STUDENT ACCESS THEIR MEAL ACCOUNT AT THE SCHOOL?

All students will receive a personal identification number (PIN) for their meal account from the food service manager at school start up. This can range from a three to five digit number. Your student should memorize this number and not share with any other students as this number is directly tied to their personal account. Your student will use this PIN number until he/she leaves that school. When the student moves to middle or a high school, a new number is assigned. Student Identification Scanners are used at some of the elementary, middle, and high schools and must be used to access their account. Please check with your student.

FORGOT YOUR LUNCH MONEY?

Although students are to pay for their meal upon receipt, students may forget their lunch or lunch money. Each school has a policy, as established by the Principal, and the Food Service Manager as to what can be charged. In most cases your student will be allowed to charge up to one meal. There will be no charging of any a la carte food items to include entrees and snacks.

MEAL CHARGES:

If your student does incur a charge, please ask your student and /or check your student's pockets or backpack for a note. You can also set up an account with PayPAMS.com to review student meal transactions.

ALA CARTE ITEMS:

Many of the schools provide extra Ala Carte items, such as ice cream, baked chips, fruit juice in addition to many specialty items. These items range in price from \$.35 to \$3.50 and are <u>not</u> included in the free and reduced price meal program.

PARENTAL RESTRICTIONS:

Restrictions can be placed on your student's meal account. Once restrictions are placed, they cannot be removed unless the parent provides the food service manager with a letter asking for the restrictions to be removed.

PREPAYMENT FOR FOOD ITEMS:

Prepayments to your child's meal account with your VISA, MasterCard, or Discover credit card can be made. Log onto www.Pay PAMS.com or call 1-888-994-5100. Payment can also be received by the food service manager in form of check or cash. If check is used, please indicate students' name and student

personal identification number (PIN) on the check in the memo section. Prepayment is encouraged as it assists in movement of students through the line.

FOOD ALLERGIES:

If your child has food allergies, please provide the school nurse with a physician's note indicating the allergies and the appropriate substitutions that are recommended by the physician or medical authority.

COMMUNICATION WITH THE FOOD SERVICE MANAGER:

The food service manager is on site prior to the school starting to begin breakfast meal preparation and departs from the school upon completion of lunch. Inquires should be made <u>prior</u> to meal service time or immediately after meal service. Please check with your school to determine the best time to contact the food service manager in the event that you have questions.

REFUNDS:

Refunds are addressed at the school level and require a written request. Please contact the food service manager for a refund.

ACCOUNT BALANCES:
