## Learning and Leading with Second Grade

Second graders have been enjoying their studies of life cycles. The Purple House was filled with growing plants and animals. We had caterpillars that turned into butterflies before our eyes! We then watched them fly as we released them in the Kinder Garden – the kindergartners butterfly garden. Some watched tadpoles become frogs and then watched as they were released into the pond behind the school. We also had some meal worms that will become beetles.

We need your help! Testing is right around the corner for KG to 5<sup>th</sup> Graders and Wards Creek Elementary is in need of Proctors. Proctors are "another set of eyes" during each testing session, making sure that students are in the right place and following the teacher's directions. They will not be administering the test.

Testing will take place March 5 – May 21. District policy states that we have a proctor in each testing room. Proctors for testing can be anyone who is willing to volunteer, and who has been approved through the district to volunteer at Wards Creek Elementary. To sign up to volunteer at Wards Creek Elementary School, you may visit the school's homepage and under "Quick Links" click on "*School Access Form*." The volunteer application is easy to fill out and is usually approved within two weeks of submission.

Please plan on arriving at Wards Creek Elementary no later than 8:15 on the date(s) that you signed up to volunteer and sign in at the front desk. You will then report directly to the Classroom you will be proctoring in. Please note that you will be assigned to proctor in a Classroom that does not have any "relatives" per the following Testing guideline:

*Test administrators must NOT administer the assessment(s) to their family members. In addition, under no circumstances may a student's parent/guardian be present in a student's testing room.*

There will be a brief training upon your arrival at Wards Creek on the date(s) you will be proctoring. We look forward to a successful testing season.

Hi Warrior Families,

I am excited to continue to discuss our K-12 Standards for Mathematical Practice. As a reminder, these standards are “habits of good mathematicians.” This month we will look at the second standard on which all students should be working.

**Standards for Mathematical Practice Standard 2: Reason abstractly and quantitatively.**

This standard asks that students make sense of quantities and their relationships in problem situations. Specifically we are looking for students who are able to both contextualize and decontextualize as they solve problems.

Students contextualize by using images or stories to understand problems. They may place an abstract or numeric problem in a context and then use that context to make sense of the mathematical ideas posed in the problem. For example, “when a student sees the expression  $40 - 26$ , she might visualize this problem by thinking, if I have 26 marbles and Marie has 40, how many more do I need to have as many as Marie? Then, in that context, she thinks, 4 more will get me to a total of 30, and then 10 more will get me to 40, so the answer is 14. In this example, the student uses a context to think through a strategy for solving the problem, using the relationship between addition and subtraction and decomposing and recomposing the quantities. She then uses what she did in the context to identify the solution of the original abstract problem.” (K-5 Elaborations of the Standards for Mathematical Practice)

Conversely we also look for students who are able to decontextualize problems. When students decontextualize, they are able to extract the abstract ideas and numeric quantities from a problem in order to work on the math, void of context. After students solve the problem they then interpret their solution in terms of the original context. For example, “to find the area of the floor of a rectangular room that measures 10m by 12 m, a student might represent the problem as an equation, solve it mentally, and record the problem and solution as  $10 \times 12 = 120$ . He has decontextualized the problem. When he states at the end that the area of the room is 120 square meters, he has contextualized the answer in order to solve the original problem.” (K-5 Elaborations of the Standards for Mathematical Practice)

So what can you do? Here are a few suggestions to help your child reason abstractly and quantitatively:

- **Encourage your child to make up a context:** If your child is stuck on a numeric problem, ask them to think of a story they could tell that would match the problem. This allows students a context to conceptualize the problem, as well as provides a way for them to check the reasonableness of their solution.
- **Decontextualizing and Re-contextualize:** If the problem your child is working on has a context, assist them in extracting the math from the problem and consider what operation or operations could be used to solve the problem. After your child comes to a solution, always have them re-contextualize, have them put their solution back in the original context and check the reasonableness of their answer.

This standard is one that students start working on in Kindergarten and continue to practice throughout their schooling. Resist the urge to give your child an answer, but continue to ask questions and allow them to practice Mathematical Practice One by having your child make sense of the problems and persevere in solving them.

# “Comfort for Canines”



This year our Kindergarten classes at Wards Creek have begun a community service project to help our local animal shelters and we need your help!

## How you can help:

Clean out your closet and throw in the towel! The shelters are in need of these items: *Blankets, towels, fleece throws, pet beds, and baby blankets.*

Think soft, absorbent, and not too bulky... things you'd wash at home. Items that can cushion the bottoms of crates and kennels, and keep dogs' noses, paws and ears dry.

## Items that are not so good to donate:

- For the most part, shelters do not want bed sheets – they are not absorbent enough and do not stand up to repeated laundering. Anything too bulky is difficult for the shelter staffs to manage; this precludes comforters, bedspreads, heavy area rugs, queen or king-sized quilts and mattress covers.
- No pillows at all.
- No electric blankets, please, unless the cords are removed.
- No clothes, please!

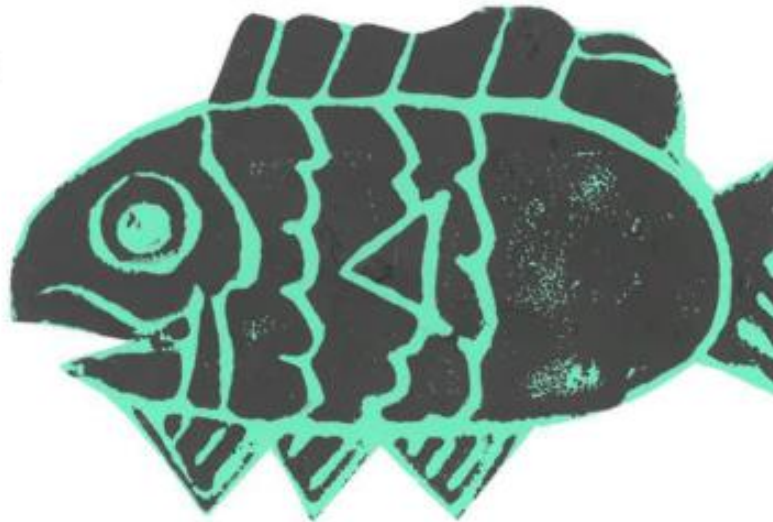
