
## Jarrell's Journal

## Nurse Boyd's Reasons to Keep My Child Home Today Parents,

Please help keep the spread of illness at a minimum by following the bottom St. John's County Illness Guidelines.

- Fever greater than 100. Student must be fever free for 24 hours WITHOUT any medication to help reduce fever including Tylenol or Motrin.
- Vomiting and diarrhea more than once. Must be vomit and diarrhea free for 24 hours to return to school.
- Many children may wake up with an upset stomach, which may not always lead to illness, but if they are lethargic and do not have an appetite, keep them home for observation. If they feel better, you can bring them in with an excused tardy.
- Rash accompanied by fever or rash that is oozy or weeping. Please seek medical advice from your physician. Many rashes can be viral or bacterial in source of may be an allergic reaction. Your physician can diagnose which and help you seek the best treatment.
- Many sore throats are from seasonal reactions to pollen. However sore throats may be from other contagious sources. If a sore throat is accompanied by fever or rash, please seek medical attention and do not bring to school.
- Coughing is common as cold season approaches. If you child has a
  cough that is not eased by over the counter or home remedies and is
  preventing your child from having a productive school day, please keep
  them home for observation. If the cough is preventing from sleeping,
  please keep home.
- Discuss hand hygiene with your child. Many children do not know how to properly wash hands. Have your child sing a short song lasting about 20 seconds while rubbing soap between fingers and all of hand surface and palm. Then rinse after.



## Technology Bytes - Nov 2016 Cyberbullying

If your child is old enough to go online alone, unfortunately the chances are that he/she **WILL EXPERIENCE CYBERBULLYING**. It is a sad sign of our times that online bullying is at an all-time high. Being bullied is one of childhood's greatest challenges. It is also a very difficult issue for most parents. But with big challenges comes big learning opportunities.

Empowering your child with guidelines and steps to take if cyberbullying happens. Here are a few things you may want to discuss with you child:

- Talk to your child about cyberbullying BEFORE IT HAPPENS.
- Encourage your child to talk to you about their online experiences.
- Tell them NEVER to respond to the bully.
- Tell them to NEVER delete the hurtful text from their device.
- If you or your child knows the bully, contact the parents to reconcile the issue.
- If the bullying is happening on a game or app site, contact the site administrator reputable sites have policies that prohibit bullying. (If they do NOT have such policies, perhaps it isn't a good site your child to use.)
- If it does happen, have your child step away from that site or app for a while to break the pattern of behavior.
- Contact mobile carriers to report bullying is it involves phone calls to text messages.
- There is a department within St. Johns County Sherriff department that responds to cyberbullying.


#### News from the PE Hut!








### **Fantastic First Grade Fun!**

#### Help Your Child Succeed in School: Build the Habit of Good Attendance Early

School success goes hand in hand with good attendance!

#### DID YOU KNOW?

- Starting in kindergarten, too many absences can cause children to fall behind in school.
- Missing 10 percent (or about 18 days) can make it harder to learn to read.
- · Students can still fall behind if they miss just a day or two days every few weeks.
- Being late to school may lead to poor attendance.
- Absences can affect the whole classroom if the teacher has to slow down learning to help children catch up.

Attending school regularly helps children feel better about school—and themselves. Start building this habit in preschool so they learn right away that going to school on time, every day is important. Good attendance will help children do well in high school, college, and at work.

#### WHAT YOU CAN DO

- · Set a regular bed time and morning routine.
- · Lay out clothes and pack backpacks the night before.
- Find out what day school starts and make sure your child has the required shots.
- Introduce your child to her teachers and classmates before school starts to help her transition.
- Don't let your child stay home unless she is truly sick. Keep in mind complaints of a stomach ache or headache can be a sign of anxiety and not a reason to stay home.
- If your child seems anxious about going to school, talk to teachers, school counselors, or other parents for advice on how to make her feel comfortable and excited about learning.
- Develop back-up plans for getting to school if something comes up. Call on a family member, a neighbor, or another parent.
- Avoid medical appointments and extended trips when school
